

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Presentation

Thanks to a rigorous selection of emerging and established regional and international galleries, Luxembourg Art Week / The Fair allows collectors and art lovers to sample the best in contemporary art.

Building on the huge success of the first four editions, Luxembourg Art Week / The Fair returns in 2020 with three complementary sections. The Main Section presents established international and regional galleries, while Take Off, the prospective section, showcases young emerging galleries and artists' collectives offering works at affordable prices. Focus, a new section as of this year, will let visitors discover the creative wealth of one of Europe's vibrant artistic scenes. This year the spotlight will be on Brussels.

As usual, Luxembourg Art Week will also present a varied programme of high-quality events, including a 'carte blanche' exhibition project by Casino Luxembourg — Forum d'art contemporain and a monumental sculpture by Jaume Plensa in collaboration with Galerie Lelong & Co., Paris and in partnership with the City of Luxembourg while extending its collaboration with major cultural institutions in the Greater Region, most notably the Rotondes in the framework of LEAP — The Luxembourg Encouragement for Artists Prize, National Museum of History and Art (MNHA) and Centre National de l'Audiovisuel (CNA) with exclusive guided tours, as well as the annual Salon of Luxembourg's



Online catalogue

After two years, the online catalogue of Luxembourg Art Week / The Fair has been refined and embedded into the fair's website, which was completely redesigned in spring to improve the user experience of our visitors. It is now possible to browse among nearly 1,500 works of art by 450 artists in a playful and interactive way thanks to the different filters by galleries, by artists, by price range, by date or by medium.

The public of Luxembourg Art Week / The Fair has thus the possibility, as during the traditional Preview, to discover in advance all of the artistic creations exhibited in the 3D virtual art fair, but also a large selection of unpublished works which enriches the selection made by gallery owners for their virtual booth.




Following the numerous cancellations of art fairs in spring, our foresight team began to develop from this summer a 3D model of the two exhibition halls with cura3D museum pro. This virtual exhibition planning solution allows the creation of custom exhibition rooms for museums, galleries, and for the first time ever a whole art fair, also taking into account architecture and dimensions of the premises, booths layout, and lighting.

Thus, visitors will be able to stroll in an environment as close as possible to reality, which will allow them to walk the aisles of the fair as if they were on-site. It will also be possible to enter the booth, all individually built according to the requirements of the galleries, to turn around, see another wall, another booth further away, then continue on his pathway to a new point of interest. Visitors will be able to interact with all the artworks, which expand in a pop-up window, displaying their captions, selling prices and a link to contact the exhibiting gallery directly.



We are therefore well aware that nothing can replace the presence of works of art and contact with gallerists, but an expended opening period, unlimited access through the Internet, and the communication bridge provided either by all exhibitors, sponsors, and partners, let's us hope that our 3D visit will arouse curiosity whose dynamic may surprise us!





For its sixth edition and due to the covid-19 epidemic, the Luxembourg Art Week team wished to deepen its cultural programme with partner institutions outside the walls. Throughout the month of November, exhibitions, a monumental sculpture, performances and guided tours will punctuate the Luxembourg landscape and cultural agenda, allowing everyone to familiarise themselves with the aesthetic, political, and social issues of today's art.

No-Man's-Land : Carte blanche exhibition by Casino Luxembourg – Forum d'art contemporain

18-22.11.2020, 33, rue Philippe II, L-2340 Luxembourg

Since its first participation in Luxembourg Art Week, Casino Luxembourg – Forum d'art contemporain has been keen to present exhibitions that question the relationship between experimentation and artistic production in the framework of a contemporary art fair.

For the 2020 edition of Luxembourg Art Week / The Fair, Casino Luxembourg has invited the Belgian artist Arnaud Eubelen (born in Liège in 1991, lives and works in Brussels) to exhibit in the unoccupied space of the former Karen Millen store, 33 rue Philippe II, close to the Casino Luxembourg. His presentation will be followed a month later by a second exhibition in the ground floor gallery of Casino Luxembourg. This double display has allowed the artist to conceive a two-stage project for two different contexts: on the one hand, a four-day cultural event for the general public during the Luxembourg Art Week and, on the other hand, a solo exhibition in a contemporary art centre.

The work of Arnaud Eubelen is situated halfway between sculpture and industrial design, questioning our relation to the concepts of artwork and object, and how we take for granted the function of certain materials. His work plays with the notions of manufactured object and handmade work of art by reappropriating various industrial materials and displacing them into different contexts. By undermining established codes as regards materials and proportions, he creates objects that appear to have been borrowed from everyday contexts (chair, lamp . . .), but which have been turned into unique works made from altered industrial materials. His work thus simultaneously questions the function of art, of luxury and of industrialisation/globalisation.

/ Monumental Sculpture by Jaume Plensa

01.11-15.12.2020, Rond-point Robert Schuman

From 1 November to 15 December 2020, Luxembourg Art Week is proud to display in collaboration with Galerie Lelong & Co. and in partnership with the City of Luxembourg, on Rond-point Robert Schuman in Luxembourg-Limpertsberg, *Carlota*, a 4-meter high monumental sculpture made of cast iron by Jaume Plensa, a world-renown Catalan artist.

Carlota

Presentation

Carlota is one of a cycle of works by Jaume Plensa created from the portraits of young girls. For a decade and half, he has formed a series of sculptures in marble, alabaster, bronze or cast iron, entitled Laura, Lou, Anna, Isabella, Chloe, Maria... From these very real young girls, who are often the children of his friends or his entourage, he creates portraits that suggest immateriality and dreams. The dimensions of Carlota are imposing and the anamorphosis of the face creates a rather illusory image. Her closed eyes invoke an infinite inner mind, recalling a phrase by Blake that is dear to the artist: One thought fills immensity. This sculpture was exhibited at the Beelden aan Zee museum in the Netherlands in 2019 (22 June-22 September 2019)

Jaume Plensa

Biography

Lives and works in Barcelona, Spain.

A very significant part of Plensa's work is in the field of sculpture in the public space. Installed in several cities in Spain, France, Japan, England, Korea, Germany, Canada, USA, etc. *The Crown Fountain*, which was unveiled in Chicago's Millennium Park in 2004, is one of Plensa's largest projects and, without doubt, one of the most brilliant. The work led to many commissions, adding to the list of works by Jaume Plensa in public spaces, right up to the most recent, *Source* (2017) in Montreal, Canada, *Bangkok Soul* (2017) in Bangkok, Thailand, *Love* (2017) in Leeuwarden, Netherlands and *Pacific Soul* (2018) in San Diego, USA. Jaume Plensa has won many prizes and citations, including the Marsh Award for Excellence in Public Sculpture, which the artist received in London in 2009 for his work *Dream*. With *Together*, Collateral Event of the 56th Venice Biennale, Basilica San Giorgio Maggiore, Jaume Plensa obtained the Global Fine Art Award for the Best Public Outdoor Installation in 2015.

/ LEAP20, The Luxembourg Encouragement for Artists Prize

15.11-29.11.2020, Rotondes

Through the Luxembourg Encouragement for Artists Prize, the Rotondes (already committed to supporting young artists in the Greater Region through the Triennale) offer contemporary artists with ties to the Grand Duchy a platform for professionalisation and greater visibility. The award aims to support artists who demonstrate an innovative approach to contemporary creation and to promote the development of their careers.

After the call for submissions launched in 2019, an international jury has selected Suzan Noesen, Hisae Ikenaga, Nina Tomàs and the duo Bruno Baltzer & Leonora Bisagno. After the name of the winner has been be revealed, the group exhibition – postponed due to the Covid-19 pandemic – will (eventually) take place in the Galerie des Rotondes.

The finalists

Suzan Noesen, of Dutch-Luxembourgish nationality, is a multidisciplinary artist based in Luxembourg. Her work questions the role of aesthetics and art in the context of social classifications and resonates with experimental anthropological research.

Hisae Ikenaga, of Mexican-Spanish nationality, lives and works in Luxembourg. Her artistic approach focuses on everyday objects that she alters so as to shift their meanings and uses. Her work is characterised by irony and absurdity, as evidenced by her recent series simulating an impossible archaeological discovery.

Nina Tomás, of Franco-Luxembourgish nationality, lives and works in Luxembourg. In her paintings, she addresses a wide variety of subjects, including ecological, economic or nervous systems and local, global or hybrid identities. Her works, animated by dreams and combining heterogeneous figures, timeframes and spaces, are imbued with a singular and complex sense of poetry.

Baltzer & Bisagno are a Luxembourg-based artist duo formed by the Franco-Luxembourgian artist Bruno Baltzer and the Italian-German artist Leonora Bisagno. Their prolific and multifaceted work questions representations and the contemporary condition of images. They develop their work in response to specific contexts — an artist residency, a political event, a news event — and explores all facets of the issues it tackles, whether formal, technical, political or cultural.

LEAP20 is organised by the Rotondes and presented by RTL



As part of Luxembourg Art Week, the Rotondes offers a guided tour of the LEAP20 exhibition on Saturday 21 November, 17.30 (guided tour limited to 9 people, bookings via tickets@rotondes.lu), as well as a meeting with the artists on Sunday 22 November from 13.00 to 15.00 (free admission, with possible regulation depending on turnout).

Land Art, a movement initiated by artists who wanted to take the art out of the gallery and the museum, was developed around creative work based on spatiality, landscape and the elements of nature. Numerous contemporary artists (Nils Udo, Richard Serra) and designers (Matali Crasset) are revisiting this approach, as evidenced by the recent exhibition Nous les arbres at the Cartier Foundation in Paris. In literature too, forests are a recurring theme (Italo Calvino, Sylvain Tesson), prompting numerous associations as well as an ecopoetic reflection on the relationships between environmental awareness and aesthetics. The aim of this panel is to initiate a cross-disciplinary discussion on environmental creation, between Land Art, research and contemporary literature.

<u>Speakers:</u> Katarzyna Kot-Bach, visual artist; Julien Thèves, writer; Carole Bisenius-Penin, researcher (Crem, Université de Lorraine)

Katarzyna Kot-Bach is an independent artist, member of the AAPL (Association des artistes plasticiens du Luxembourg a.s.b.l.) and the Luxembourgians artists' agency ARTmadeinluxembourg. Her work comprises predominantly wooden and bronze sculptures but also installations and Land Art. A lecturer in wood carving at the Summer Academy, she runs the Art in Nature workshop as part of the Educational Trail Mirador in Steinfort (Administration de la nature et des forêts). She is also a co-organiser of the Land Art Biennial in Luxembourg.

'In this "virtual" age of ubiquitous consumption, my imagination finds refuge in the forest. I adopt trees, and through the dialogue I establish with them, they absorb the traces of the world that surrounds me. I enter the forest that leads me back to myself.'

Julien Thèves is a Paris-based author, screenwriter and translator exploring urban space and natural landscapes (*Les Rues bleues*, 2020; *Le Pays d'où l'on ne revient jamais*, 2018) through poetic and autobiographical writings that merge introspection and description. He has also produced sound documentaries for France Culture. He is currently in residency at the 'Maison des Ilustres' Robert Schuman in Scy-Chazelles, where he is developing a literary project centred on forests and a geography of the intimate.

Carole Bisenius-Peniz is a lecturer in contemporary literature at the University of Lorraine and a member of the Centre for Research on Mediations (CREM), where she co-directed the Praxitèle team 'Arts, Cultures and Mediations'. Her work focuses on writers' residencies and cultural mediation systems. She also runs an outhouse lab that includes a writers' residency within a museum in France ('Maison des Illustres' Robert Schuman, Scy-Chazelles, 2016) and within a cultural institution in Canada (Maison de la litérature, Quebec, 2017).

Sections

For this new edition, the exhibitors at Luxembourg Art Week / The Fair will be divided into three complementary sections: Main Section, Take Off, and a new section, Focus.

Main Section

The Main Section brings together more than 30 established contemporary art galleries representing internationally renowned artists. It allows visitors, collectors and investors in art to discover the best in contemporary artistic creation.

/ Take Off

Luxembourg Art Week and its official partner, the Ministry of Culture, are also renewing their support of the emerging contemporary art scene. Launched in 2016, Take Off is reserved for galleries, institutions, organisations and artists' collectives, that represent young, lesser-known artists who produce works at affordable prices.



Focus Brussels

Focus showcases the strength and vitality of the contemporary art scene in a different city each year. It presents a selection of at least ten art spaces and young galleries from a given scene, which will be highlighted within the Take Off section. Providing a formidable springboard for young emerging galleries, this section responds to the expectations of an audience of curious art lovers and increasingly demanding Luxembourgian and international collectors.

This year's Focus section will showcase the Belgian capital by presenting the emerging Brussels art scene.



Selection committee

The selection committee of Luxembourg Art Week / The Fair is composed of renowned gallerists, collectors and curators from different backgrounds and representing a variety of aesthetic sensibilities.

Bernard Ceysson, Artistic advisor, Ceysson & Bénétière

As the director of the Saint-Etienne museums in the 1960s and 70s, Bernard Ceysson pursued an ambitious acquisition policy focused on contemporary art. He has also served as Director of the Musée national d'art moderne at Centre Georges Pompidou in Paris and the Museum of Modern Art Grand-Duc Jean (Mudam) in Luxembourg. After retiring from active business in 2003, he went on to become the artistic advisor of Ceysson & Bénétière gallery, founded by his son François and Loïc Bénétière, where he continues to defend Claude Viallat and the Supports/ Surfaces movement, of which he is a globally recognised expert. He is the author of numerous catalogues, books and articles, many of which are considered art-historical references.

Patrick Majerus, contemporary art collector and donor

A collector of contemporary art with a focus on young artists, Patrick Majerus has been concentrating his acquisition policy on artists such as Kader Attia, Tim Berresheim, Katja Novitskova, Avery Singer and Michael E. Smith, whose artistic development he is following closely. He has made numerous donations to Mudam, Centre Georges Pompidou, the Ludwig museums and Berlinische Galerie, always driven by the wish to make the work of the artists he supports accessible to the public at large.

Kevin Muhlen, Director, Casino Luxembourg – Forum d'art contemporain

After studying art history in Brussels and Strasbourg, Kevin Muhlen joined the team of Casino Luxembourg – Forum d'art contemporain in 2004. As its Artistic Director since 2009, he has been developing its artist residency programme while focusing its exhibition policy on monographic exhibitions by international artists. He is regularly invited to curate events and exhibitions abroad and frequently contributes to artists' catalogues and publications.



Delphine Munro, Head of Arts and Culture, European Investment Bank

After more than twenty years of experience in managing cultural projects, art collections and communication for museums, cultural institutions and companies, Delphine Munro was named Head of Arts and Culture of the European Investment Bank in 2009. In this function, she is managing the bank's art collection, a mentoring programme and an artist residency programme, as well as being in charge of the preservation of cultural heritage. She is also President of the Board of Directors of Casino Luxembourg – Forum d'art contemporain, member of the Board of Directors of the International Association of Corporate Collections of Contemporary Art (IACCCA) and Director of the Friends of Museums Luxembourg.

/ Alex Reding, Director, Nosbaum Reding, and CEO, Luxembourg Art Week

A trained artist, Alex Reding founded his first gallery, Alimentation Générale, in 2001, with a programme focusing on the young international scene. In 2006 the gallery was renamed Nosbaum Reding and relocated to the historic part of the capital, expanding its scope to include young talents from Luxembourg and the Greater Region. He has been serving as the Director of Luxembourg Art Week since its inception in 2005.

Carine Smets, contemporary art collector, founder and Director, Smets Groupe

The founder of Smets group, a specialist retailer in luxury products and design (9 stores with more than 100 staff), Carine Smets has been a passionate collector of contemporary art for more than twenty years. Along with her husband, who collects comic books and original drawings, she spends the better part of her free time visiting artists' studios, museums, exhibitions and art fairs.

Nordine Zidoun, Director, Zidoun–Bossuyt Gallery

Nordine Zidoun opened his first gallery in Luxembourg in 2008, where he presented young emerging African-American artists such as Wangechi Mutu, Shinique Smith, Jeff Sonhouse and Terry Adkins. In 2013 he teamed up with Audrey Bossuyt to found Zidoun-Bossuyt Gallery, which shows international artists such as Noel Anderson, Luca Dellaverson, Tomokazu Matsuyama and Adam Parker Smith, but also representatives of the local scene such as Martine Feipel & Jean Bechameil and Franck Miltgen. A specialist of the work of Jean-Michel Basquiat, he initiated and curated the first monographic exhibition dedicated to this artist in Luxembourg, Jean-Michel Basquiat Now!, at Zidoun-Bossuyt Gallery in 2016.



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
